The faculty and staff recruitment is done on the basis of merit as per the qualification prescribed by UGC and Govt. of Maharashtra Rule. The vacancies arising at different points of time are notified in news papers and accordingly applications are invited.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The industry-institute need based. As and when need is felt the cooperation is extended by industrial organisations. In project placement the industrial units are approached and students are placed.

.3.9 Admission of Students

Admissions are given according to norms of Dr. BAMU. Aurangabad

- Students for general courses like B.A., B.Sc. and B.Com. are selected on first-come first-served basis depending upon the number of seats available provided, they have minimum passed the qualifying examination.
- The Counseling Cell of the college guides the aspirants for different courses to make a choice according to their aptitude and ability.
- The admissions to PG courses are made through separate CET (Common Entrance Test) for each subject.
- The college admits the students solely on the basis of merit in the Common Entrance Test conducted by the college provided, they have minimum 45 % marks in the qualifying examination.
- ☑ The college being a minority institution, 51 % seats are filled from minority community students.

7. Innovations and Best Practices

7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.

The students of the Zoology department have presented a paper 'Harmony with Nature" at a conference organised by the Zoology department of Dr.BAMU, Innovative geological artefacts such as rock balls, mineral balls, and gem balls have been prepared by the Geology department. The geohydrological mapping and well inventory survey was carried out for the village Dhamangaon for aquifer enhancement studies.

Survey of the old wells of Aurangabad city in order to rejeuvenate them for combating the acute water scarcity was undertaken by the Geology department of our college. Several articles on water budgeting and management written by the Principal and Geology staff members have appeared in the Times of India and Maharashtra times. Six students of the Geology department have completed internship at Jindal drilling and Industry ltd ,Mumbai.

Frequent industrial or laboratory visits have been arranged by Botany, Chemistry and Microbiology departments. Museum visits have been undertaken by the History department.

BEST PRACTICE: Geological mapping at Dhamangaon

Title of the practice: "Geohydrological mapping and well inventory survey at Dhamangaon"

Goal: To enhance aquifer literacy amongst the villagers and field training for the students of Geology.

The Relevance: The entire Marathwada is reeling under acute water scarcity and thus educating the villagers with respect to available resources of groundwater and ways and means to increase the storage and recharge will benefit the community in the long run.

The Practice: The acquisition of the village map was done from the Tehsils. A team of 20 students (Girls and boys) of Geology II and III year along with 2 staff members visited the area under investigation. The well inventory survey of around 50 wells

covering the entire study area was done .The measurements of the rock types, water level , recuperation and pump out was noted with the active participation of the villagers. The instruments used were Brunton Compass for location , Toposheet ,measuring tape, Resistivity metre, Dumpy level (EDM), water level recorder.

Evidence of success: The data collected was submitted to the Grampanchayat for the benefit of the stakeholders. The benefit is ultimately transferred free of cost to the layman farmer who is now aware of the water level in his fields (agricultural land). The data will be presented to the Central Govt and a demand for a similar project for Jalna district in PAN Maharashtra will be placed with the help of GEOFORUM, MSSM, GRASP, our collaborative NGO's of Aurangabad.

Problems encountered and resources required: Hostel facilities for girls will make it convenient for more such students to participate in field level activities. Funding will also ensure that these activities are continued all of the year.

BEST PRACTICE II:

Title of the practice : Manufacturing of geological artefacts.

Goal: To manufacture Gelogical artefacts from semiprecious stones in workshops in our campus.

The Relevance: Aurangabad is the Jaipur of Deccan in terms of precious and semiprecious stones found in these areas. An Eminent German Gemmologist ,Prof. Rainer Schultz Gutler who visited our campus apprised us of the market potential of gemstone carving and cutting pieces. These have commercial market and hence the production was undertaken in workshops of our campus.

The Practice: Students are involved in the collection of semi precious stones as part of their Geological excursions and field work. These stones are manually sorted and then sent for shaping and polishing in the workshops. In this manner some rock balls, mineral balls and Gem balls have been prepared. The entire work is taken care by the students and staff of the Geology department and is a model activity in this region.

Evidence of success: Some of these Gem balls have been placed in hotels, restaurants, gardens etc.

Problems encountered and resources required: The shortage of manpower, the stock of semiprecious stones and rock samples, breakage of the artefacts during transfer, breakdown of machines are some of the problems that have been encountered so far.

7.4 Contribution to environmental awareness / protection

A count of different trees, plants and fauna was undertaken as part of green audit of the campus. The green house has been maintained in the botanical garden. Vermicompost is produced in the college. There are a few bird houses and bird feed and water is provided in these houses. Tree plantation drives are undertaken form time to time. The staff and student of the college have participated in the "Swachata abhiyan'. Awareness regarding environmental pollutants that cause cancer, Judicious use of natural resources, Celebration of "Earth day" and "Environmental day", have also been undertaken.
